A session for a well-established group in the catholic tradition held during a communion service.

Getting Ready for Baby Jesus (Advent) unit: week 2

Welcome

Welcome your group. Let's start by going round the circle
and saying our name out loud.

Go round the circle so that every adult and child has the chance to say his or her name (and introduce any dolls, teddies or toys). If any of the children don't want to say their name or aren't able to, you (or a parent or carer) could say it for them and wave. It's time to sing our Welcome Song!

Getting Ready to Worship: Option 1

Invite the children to make the sign of the cross slowly with you. As the children become more confident, invite a child to lead the action as the whole group says the words and makes the sign of the cross.

Introducing the Unit: Option 2

Focus: the liturgical colour, purple

Who can tell us what colour season we're in now?

If appropriate: You may have seen it in church.


The colour purple reminds us it's time to 'get ready'! Baby Jesus is coming at Christmas!

If appropriate: Let's all look out for purple when we go back into church.

Or: Let's remember to look and see what colour we're in next time we go into church.

Gathering Song: Option 1

This Gathering Song remains the same for the four-week unit.

You might like to show the children a picture of the sun rising, if you used one in the storytelling for week 1. Like we wait for the sun to 'dawn', to come up, in the morning.

If you're using imaginative aids, ask two or three children to give them out. Let's show the sun 'dawning' with our bodies.

Let's crouch down low . . . Let's close our eyes . . . it's dark! Let's show the sun coming up and up and out . . . in the morning.

Lead the children in showing the sun rising with your hands as you stand up.

The sun is 'dawning'!

Now let's do that as we sing our song, 'Jesus, Light of the World'.

My goodness, that was busy! Who's feeling tired? When we're getting ready for Christmas it can get really busy and really exciting!

Who's excited about Christmas? In all the busyness, let's remember to also have time for some quiet. Let's remember to get ready for the very special baby that's coming: Baby Jesus.

Let's sit quietly now and close our eyes . . .

Let's imagine holding Baby Jesus in our arms and singing to him quietly and gently. Baby Jesus will be born at Christmas!

Lead the children in rocking a baby and singing quietly.



Interactive Bible Storytelling: Getting Ready for Baby Jesus, week 2

If you're using the What's in the Box? option (p. 221), invite one of the children to open the box. Inside will be an angel or a picture of an angel. Like last week, you might even like to show your group a photograph of an angel depicted somewhere in your church building.

What's in the box? Ask the child to respond.

This is the angel Gabriel.

He's a very special angel.

Gabriel takes messages from God to people:

he's like a post-angel.

Today Gabriel's going to take a message to a girl called Mary.

To tell our story today, we need to learn a song.

The actions of this song are designed to mirror a jack-in-the-box, with its lid closing and the puppet bursting out at the 'pop' moment. To teach this song, sing it alone the first time, with the children copying your actions. See if they can join in on the second time around.

Start standing on tiptoes with your hands stretched high. You could make angel wings (like butterfly wings) with your hands.

An angel came to Ma-a-a-ry.

Bring hands down from on high and come down from tiptoes.

'You will have a baby!

Rock baby, standing at normal height.

He will be the Son of God!'

Crouch down on the ground like tiny child.

'Yes!' sa-id Mary.

Jump up and shout 'Yes!'

Repeat until the group is confident.

We're going to tell the story of our song together now.

First we need to practise showing

how we feel with just our faces.

Not opening our mouths at all.

Who can show me . . .

This Bible Storytelling is the only part of the session that changes every week.

As you list the following emotions one by one, give the children time to show each emotion with their face.

You might like to point out some good examples given by the children:

sad . . .

happy . . .

confused (when you don't understand) . . .

amazed! . . .

scared.

We're ready to tell our story.

I wonder how Mary's feeling now?

Invite the children to explore their feelings or use the following. As you list these emotions one by one, give the children time to show each emotion with their face. You might like to pick out some examples given by the children.

Can you show me amazed?

Show me scared!

Show me happy! Show me excited!

Mary is feeling lots of things!

Mary's also feeling confused.

Show me confused! Mary doesn't understand.

Can you show me how you look

when you don't understand - when you're confused?

Lead the children in looking confused.

Mary says, 'How? I'm not meant to have a baby yet!

I'm just a girl.'

Let's put our hands out like a question and say 'How?'

The angel says, 'The Holy Spirit will come on you . . .'

Let's all raise our hands in the air and bring them down in front of us

to show the Holy Spirit coming down.

The angel says,

'The Holy Spirit will come down.

Your baby will be very special, he will be the Son of God!'

Mary's baby isn't going to just be a king, He's going to be God! I wonder how Mary is feeling now? Can you show me? One last special action! . . .

And then, do you know what Mary says? She says, 'Yes!' Can you nod your head in a big 'Yes'? Lead the children in nodding: 'Yes!'

Mary says, 'I am God's servant. YES. I will do this!' Then the angel leaves. I wonder how Mary is feeling now? How would you feel, if an angel came to your home?! Can you show me?

Let's sing our song about Mary's story.

Accept any responses.

Start standing on tiptoes with your hands stretched high. You could make angel wings (like butterfly wings) with your hands.

An angel came to Ma-a-a-ry. Bring hands down from on high and come down from tiptoes.

'You will have a baby! Rock baby, standing at normal height.

He will be the Son of God!' Crouch down on the ground like a tiny child.

'Yes!' sa-id Mary. Jump up and shout 'Yes!'

Thankfully, Mary said 'yes!' After three, let's all nod and say 'yes!' together like Mary.

1, 2, 3 . . . Yes!

Let's sing our song one last time to finish and sing our 'yes' especially loud and clear. Let's imagine saying 'yes' to God like Mary.

Start by standing on tiptoes with your hands stretched high.

Let's close our eyes for a moment.

I wonder if there's someone special you'd like to pray for? Let's imagine them now.

Now, let's imagine Jesus coming to them. Does Jesus say anything? Does Jesus do anything? Let's open our eyes.

Prayer Action: Option 3

John 8.12; Matthew 4.16

Action: placing lit candles (battery tealights) on a world map

Place your world map in the centre of the circle.

This is a map of the world.

Jesus is the Light of the World! Show the children one or more baskets/trays holding lit battery tealights. Now as we pray, we're going to turn the lights off for a moment and look at these candles here.

In a moment, Name and Name are going to bring round these candles. If you like, you could take one. Let's sing as we wait in the dark. Let's hold our hands out gently like this Model cupped hands as we wait for Jesus to shine in our world.

This time of prayer remains the same for the four-week unit and can be used for any unit. There are different Prayer Building Blocks available.

> At St Peter's, Walworth, we've used a map jigsaw (the children can also explore it afterwards).

Hum the tune together, with the words 'Jesus, hear our prayer!' as a refrain, until all the children and adults who wish to take tealights have done so.

If appropriate:

At the moment, there's fighting in the world

here and here. As leader, place a candle on the chosen locations.

Name the countries or areas if appropriate.

There's been an earthquake [or other disaster]

here. As leader, place a candle.

There are people who have no homes here. As leader, place a candle.

There are people who need our prayers all over the world.

As we sing again, let's put our lights on the world.

You can put your little light anywhere you like.

Let's ask God to hear our lights as prayers for the world.

Hum the tune together, with the words 'Jesus, hear our prayer!' as a refrain, as you lead the children in placing the candles on the map. We've found that asking the children to do this in age groups helps, as the older children tend to be more intent on finding a location than the others. We invite babies first, then nursery and reception children, then Year 1 and upwards (including the adults). Once all the children and adults who wish to place a candle have done so, end with the final verse of the 'Jesus, hear our prayer!' song.

Creative Response

This is a well-established group in a rhythm with their Creative Responses. Each week they present the group with one starter idea that's related to the week's story and two other starter ideas that are related to the unit and therefore remain the same for the four-week unit.

As babies and toddlers are present in the group, they also provide Sensory Starter Ideas that remain the same for the four-week unit.

The books provide a wide range of Starter Ideas for each week & unit, including print-and-go material.

Weekly Starter Idea:

Invite the children to paint Mary's face with pastels or paints. 'I wonder what Mary looked like?' Encourage the children to think of a 'strong woman' they know who would be brave enough to say 'yes' to God like Mary (their mum, teacher, aunt, head teacher, granny, a friend) to use as a model. Or the children might like to let their imagination go wild. Provide paper, crayons/pencils or paints/pastels, or other interesting media (p. 256). Optional: you may like to provide face templates (p. 267 or website) as a quide

Unit Starter Ideas:

- Invite the children to explore light shining in the darkness by creating their own 'light' patterns with oil pastels, paint, chalk or glitter on dark paper. Provide dark paper plus oil pastels/paint/chalk/glitter.
- Invite the children to collage their own angel: 'I wonder what angels might look like?' Provide: angel templates (p. 283 or website), glue, scissors, collage materials (p. 255).



Sensory Starter Ideas:

- a Baby Jesus doll along with a manger
- Christmas cards of famous Nativity paintings or major characters from the stories plus a box with a slot cut into it for the children to post the cards
- a durable Nativity set (we use PlayMobil 123's Christmas manger)
- a range of plastic animals from the Nativity stories: sheep, a donkey, cows, hens;
- battery tealights with a wooden tealight holder with four holes for children to place the candles in and take out again.
- a foil survival blanket cut into medium size pieces
- board books with Nativity stories
- a range of different Christmas smells for the children to explore. Add drops of essential oils to scraps of material and place in little pots for the children to investigate.

Sharing God's Peace: Option 2

Song: 'Peace is flowing like a river' (traditional). Isaiah 66.12, niv Tune: Traditional.

Hold one end of the peace cloth (see Guide, Book 1, p. 231) and ask one of the older children or an adult to hold the other end. Start singing the Peace Song. As the children begin to gather, invite them to join in holding a small section of the cloth, raising and lowering it so it 'flows' like a river as you sing together.

Invite the children to open their hands towards you.

Lead the children in giving and receiving the Peace.
